The Trevor Project is the world's largest suicide prevention and crisis intervention organization for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer & Questioning (LGBTQ) young people.

Our mission: to end suicide among LGBTQ youth.

The Trevor Project aims to do this through five key programs:



Crisis services. Direct suicide prevention and crisis intervention services to support LGBTQ youth 24/7 via phone, text, and chat



Peer support. The world's largest safe space social networking community for LGBTQ youth



Research. Evaluations and external research that support The Trevor Project in significantly improving its services while maintaining preeminence in scientific inquiry



Education and public awareness. Programs, trainings, and content promoting awareness around issues and policies relevant to LGBTQ youth and the adults who support them



Advocacy. Advocacy at the federal, state, and local levels to fight for policies and laws that protect LGBTQ youth

In addition to our direct services, we invest in key program areas that help ensure LGBTQ young people never enter a state of crisis in the first place. **This holistic strategy – driven by our subject matter expertise, data, and innovative approaches – makes The Trevor Project uniquely impactful and a world leader in LGBTQ mental health.**

CRISIS SERVICES

Suicide is the second leading cause of death among young people, and **LGBT youth are more than 4x more likely to attempt suicide than their peers**. For more than 22 years, The Trevor Project has worked to save young lives through our 24/7, free, and confidential crisis services, TrevorLifeline, TrevorText, and TrevorChat.

Over the past three years, The Trevor Project has directly served **50% more crisis contacts** (*people contacting our crisis services*) year-over-year.

INNOVATION

Artificial Intelligence Empowers Our Crisis Services

The Trevor Project was selected as a Google.org AI Impact Challenge grantee — chosen as one of 20 awardees out of over 2,600 applications. Our partnership has grown into a multi-year collaboration enabled by \$2.7M in funding, hands-on help from Google employees, and the implementation of new technologies using artificial intelligence.



Google and Trevor teamed up to use machine learning to:

- Ensure youth at the highest risk of suicide are connected to a crisis counselor most quickly
- Roll out user-experience improvements that will create a more welcoming and affirming experience for youth in crisis
- Train significantly more volunteer crisis counselors
- Exponentially grow our global community of LGBTQ youth on TrevorSpace and work to keep them safe

TREVORSPACE

TrevorSpace is the world’s largest, life-affirming social media platform for LGBTQ youth ages 13 to 24.

A moderated space protected from hate speech and discrimination, TrevorSpace fosters intersectional communities while shielding LGBTQ youth from alienation and harm through peer-to-peer support.



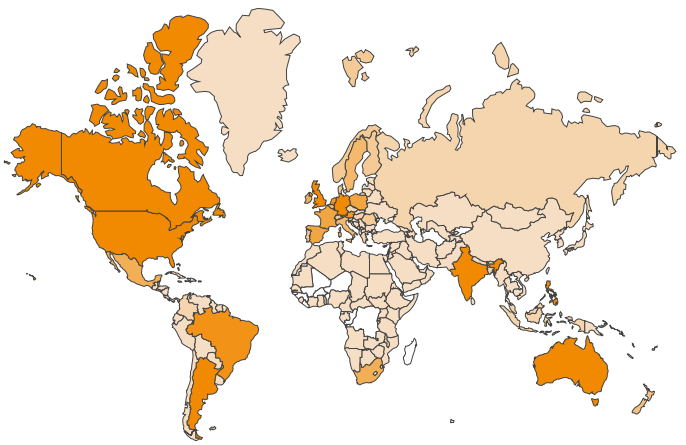

RESEARCH

Our Research team leverages internal and external data to inform public knowledge – and our own programs – bringing new insights and clinical implications to the fields of suicidology and LGBTQ youth mental health.

Our second annual **National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health** was the **largest survey of LGBTQ youth mental health ever conducted**, and provides crucial data around mental health disparities, discrimination, housing instability, barriers to accessing mental health care, conversion therapy, and suicide.

EDUCATION

Using our unique expertise in LGBTQ mental health and crisis intervention, our team provides resources for LGBTQ youth and educates adults on LGBTQ competent suicide prevention, risk detection, and response.

Ally Training

Provides a framework for understanding LGBTQ people and the unique challenges they face. Participants explore their own biases, build their knowledge and understanding, and explore the importance of empathy.

Lifeguard Workshop

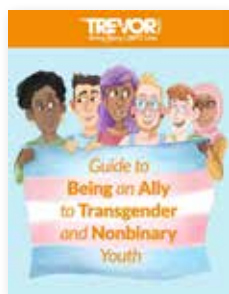
Last year, nearly 15,000 youth-serving adults and students accessed the Lifeguard training, a free online tool that provides curriculum and resources for middle school and high school classrooms to support the mental health of the LGBTQ young people in their lives.

CARE Training

Focuses on the unique mental health challenges of LGBTQ people. Attendees explore the tenets of CARE's acronym — Connect, Ask, Respond, Empower — including how to have conversations about mental health and how to spot the warning signs of suicide.

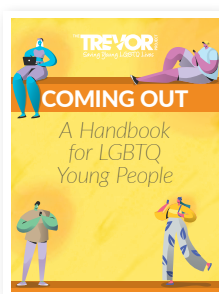

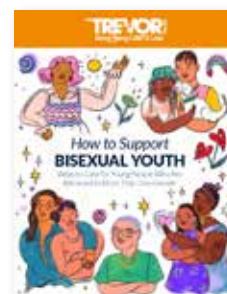

ADVOCACY

Trevor's advocacy team ensures that LGBTQ youth are protected from dangerous, discriminatory laws and policies that can have a significant impact on their mental health.

Protect LGBTQ Youth from the Dangers of Conversion Therapy

Trevor's Advocacy team has helped protect LGBTQ youth from conversion therapy in 20 U.S. states and Washington, D.C. Last year, we achieved two landmark victories: Virginia became the first Southern U.S. state to outlaw the harmful practice, and Utah, a state where 48% of LGBTQ youth reported suicide attempts in 2018-2019, did the same.

Implement Inclusive Suicide Prevention Policies in U.S. Schools

We work with school districts around the country to help them implement a Model School District Policy for Suicide Prevention, which includes standard and recommended prevention, intervention, and postvention policies.

Expand The Collection of Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity (SOGI) Information

Throughout the country, it is not mandatory for death records to track information about sexual orientation or gender identity – data which could be used to inform policies to save LGBTQ lives. Our team is currently working with LA county to train medical examiners, death investigators, and coroners to investigate violent deaths in the LGBTQ community – including suicide, hate crimes, and homicide.

Protect LGBTQ Youth From Harmful Policies and Laws

All young people deserve access to safe and supportive healthcare, education, and participation in youth activities, free from harassment and discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. Across the country The Trevor Project works to oppose bills seeking to block best practice medical care for trans and nonbinary youth, as well as their participation in school sports, and use of pronouns.



LGBTQ youth who underwent conversion therapy were **more than twice as likely to report having attempted suicide** and **more than 2.5 times as likely to report multiple suicide attempts in the past year.**

COVID-19

Physical distancing and school closures have left many LGBTQ youth confined to unsupportive, rejecting, or even abusive home environments, resulting in the loss of positive social connections that can reduce the risk of suicide.

Impact On LGBTQ Youth

Since the start of the pandemic the volume of youth reaching out to our crisis services has significantly increased, at times **spiking to more than double** volumes earlier in 2020.

Mentions of the pandemic increased 60x since shelter at home orders began, and comprised a quarter of all crisis services conversations.

Remote Operations

In early March 2020, we acted quickly to transition from physical call centers to a completely remote lifeline for the first time in our 22-year history. We installed new technology and protocols, and invested in new equipment and a data-secure platform to protect our counselors while continuing to support the LGBTQ youth who rely on our services every day. Through the transition, our crisis services remained uninterrupted and 24/7.

Myths

More people in the U.S. have died of suicide than COVID-19 during the pandemic.

LGBTQ youth mental health is better now, since they don't have to be in school where bullying often occurs.

Most LGBTQ youth between the ages of 13-24 live in a home that affirms their LGBTQ identity.

Facts

Reports of depression and anxiety are high, and LGBTQ youth are reporting more challenges related to isolation and loneliness than straight/cisgender peers.

In our 2020 National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health, under 50% of LGBTQ youth ages 13-24 lived in homes that were LGBTQ-affirming.

U.S. suicide data have not been released for 2020. In the U.S. there have been over 350,000 COVID-19 deaths as of January 3rd 2020. Fewer than 50k suicide deaths occur annually in the U.S. The number of excess deaths since the start of COVID-19 is not nearly enough to make up for this difference.

ALL BLACK LIVES MATTER

As The Trevor Project continues to support Black LGBTQ youth in crisis, last year we found that they often expressed a wide range of emotions over the senseless and unjust violence against Black Americans.


Supporting Black LGBTQ Youth

Holding multiple marginalized identities, Black LGBTQ young people can experience increased rates of discrimination, rejection, threats, and violence – a multitude of risk factors that can lead to negative mental health outcomes.

In June 2020, The Trevor Project paused our Pride fundraising campaign to grant space to the fight for racial justice and guided our corporate partners to do the same. We also engaged in meaningful, tough, and necessary conversations about corporate social responsibility, allyship, and how to show solidarity with Black Americans.

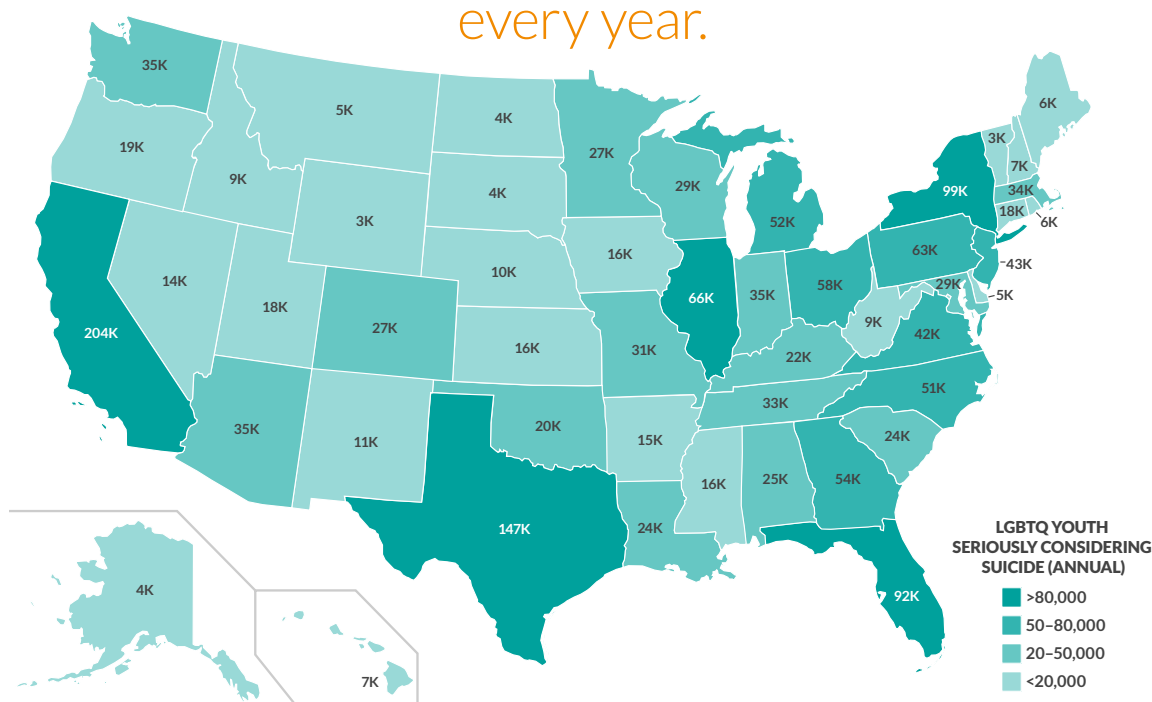

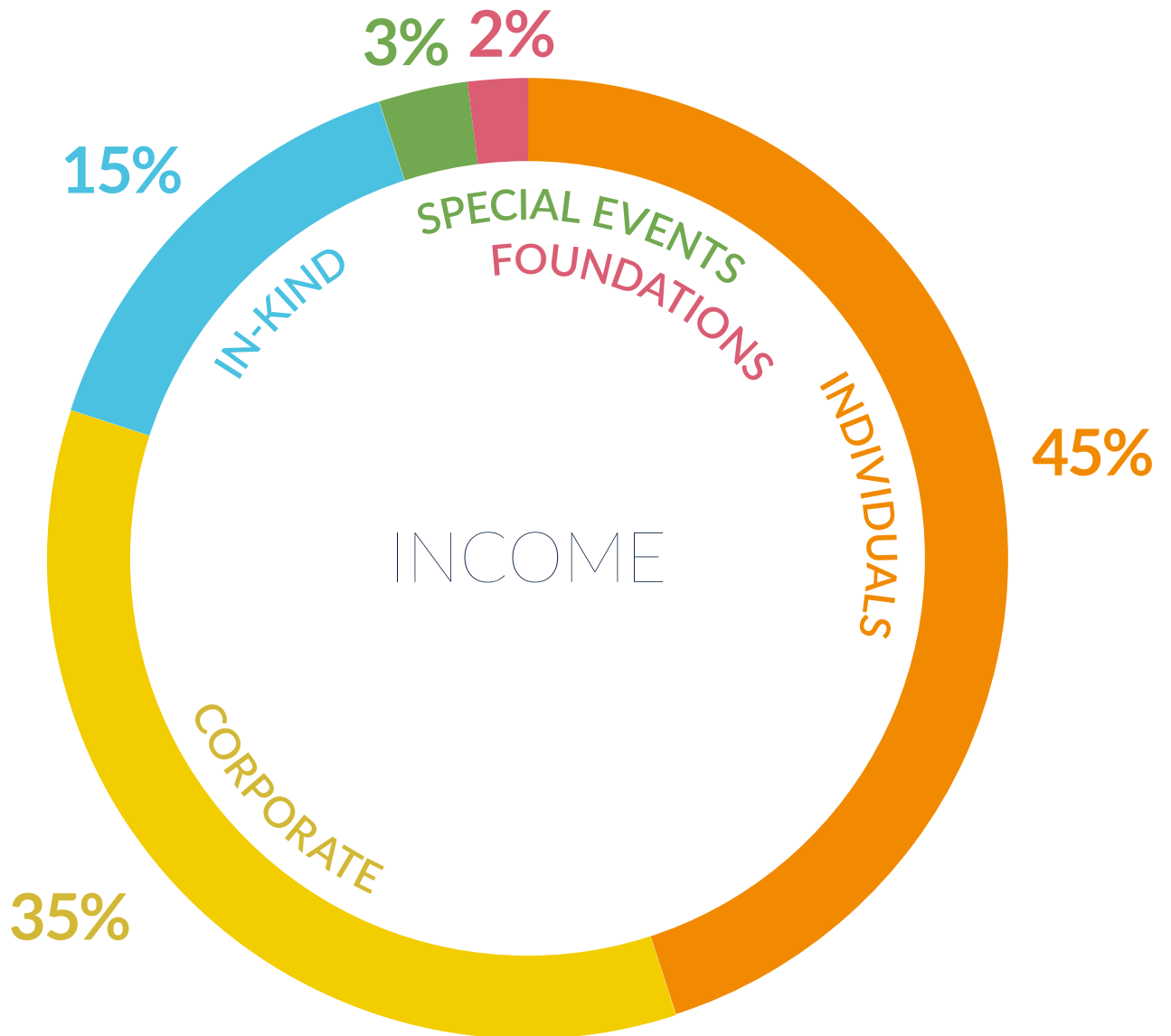


FINANCIALS

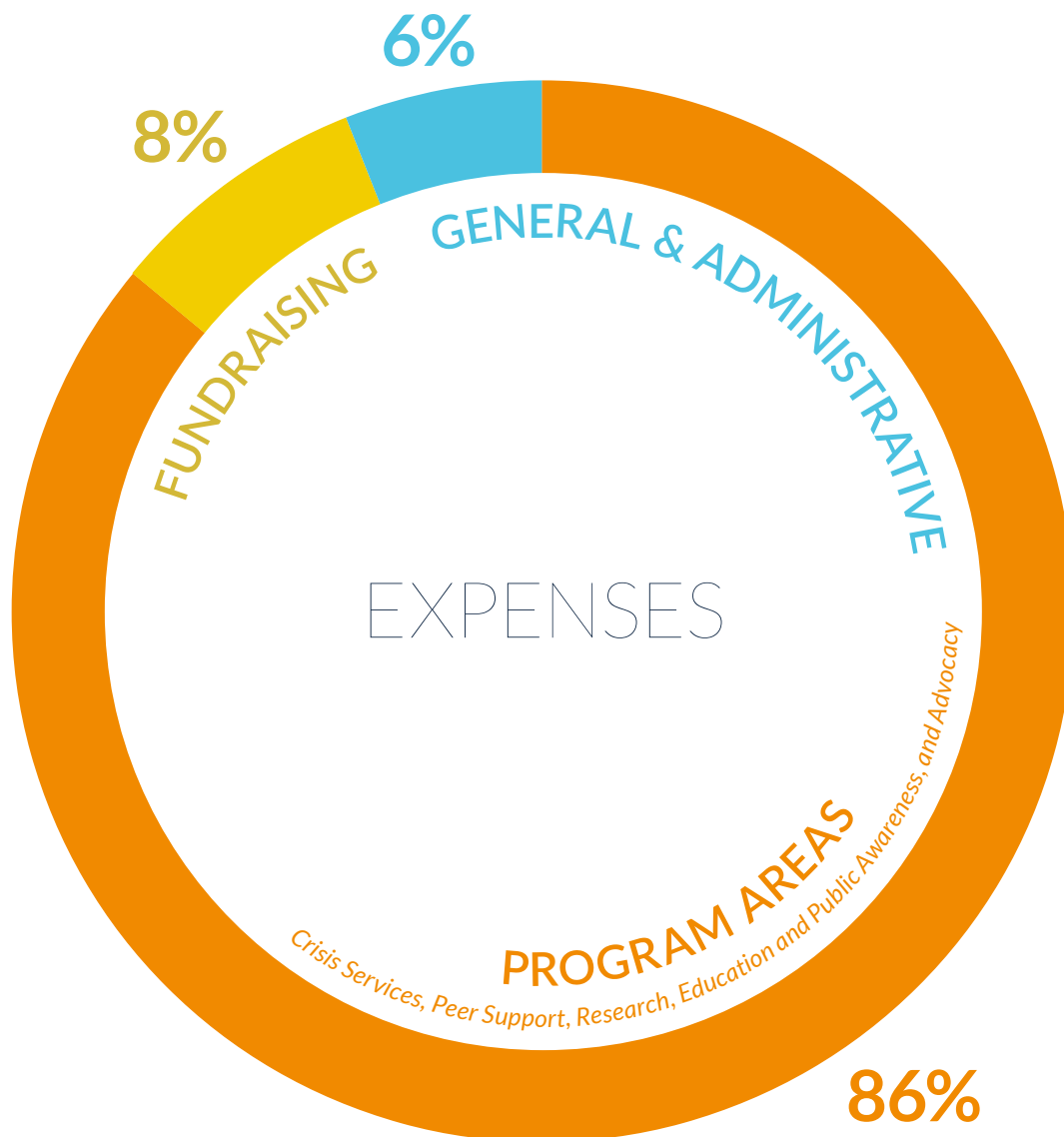

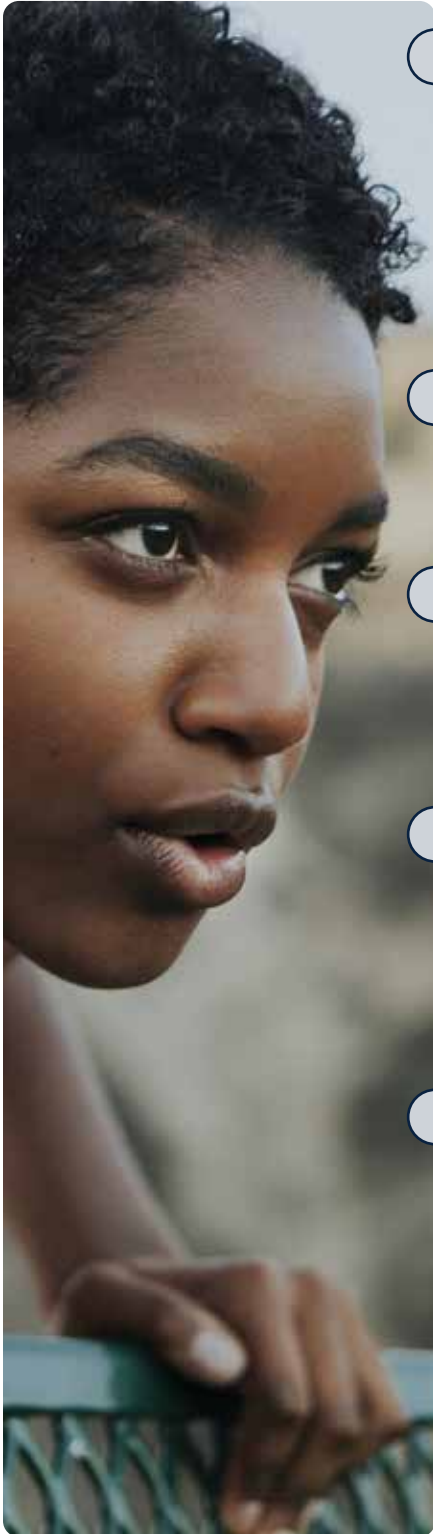

THE YEAR AHEAD

With the generous support of our community of donors and partners, in the year ahead we plan to scale our key program areas to make an even greater impact for LGBTQ young people.



Crisis Services

- Increase the capacity of our Crisis Services to provide 250,000 LGBTQ youth in crisis with free, 24/7 confidential crisis counseling by July 2021.
- Redesign and launch a new Lifeline volunteer training program.

Peer Support

- Increase TrevorSpace's users from 300,000 to 400,000 (a growth of 33% year-over-year) by July 2021.

Research

- Analyze and release the data from the 2021 National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health, and publish 12 total research briefs on high-impact topics over the year.

Education & Public Training

- Conduct over 40 trainings and continue to teach our Mental Health Course to educate more youth-facing leaders and community partners about LGBTQ youth suicidality.

Advocacy

- Advocate for legislation to be introduced protecting youth from conversion therapy in 20 total states and 50 municipalities.
- Advocate for bills to be introduced for schools to implement comprehensive suicide prevention policies in four states.
- Support the implementation and launch of The National Suicide Hotline Designation Act, which will allow Americans to simply dial '988' to reach the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.
